Definitions


- Believe not including religious believes

Science – a fundament of modern societies

2004 Indian Ocean Tsunami

- 26 Dec 2004 Mw 9.3 earthquake off the west coast of Northern Sumatera
- triggered Indian Ocean wide Tsunami
- with many people killed, including many foreign tourists, and livelihoods lost
- subsequent international involvement
- since that setup of tsunami warning system

Tsunami Early Warning System




Tsunami hoaxes/rumors

- usually start and spread via e—mail attachments (usually in Thai language)
- picked up by regular Thai and English language media (newspaper, TV)
- People here in Thailand often believe them!
- Examples from 2009, 2010,... still going on these days

Hoaxes / Rumors

- deliberately fabricated falsehood made to masquerade as truth
- unverified account or explanation of events circulating from person to person and pertaining to an object, event, or issue in public concern

Meteorological Dept denies speculation of massive quake, tsunami

BANGKOK, 11 June 2010 (NNT) – The Meteorological Department warns people not to panic about a speculation of an impending powerful earthquake and tsunami, which may hit Thailand tomorrow.

The Meteorological Department yesterday announced that none of the disaster-monitoring centers worldwide had issued any warning about a major quake which, as rumored, would occur on 12 June 2010. The statement said that no one could predict as to where or when an earthquake would take place.

State of the art knowledge:

We cannot predict earthquakes and tsunamis triggered by earthquakes.








Earthquake fears trigger memories of tsunami

- Kongpop U-yen, a Thai engineer who works at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (Nasa) in the US, said the alignment of the planets on Saturday could cause natural disasters such as earthquakes and tsunamis.
- The theory was backed by former NDWC chief Smith Dharmasarojana, who said it was backed by scientific data.
- The forecast, however, met with criticism from the scientific community.
- Mr Kongpop said a solar eclipse was due to occur on Saturday night as a result of the alignment of the earth, the moon and the sun. The alignment would release considerable cumulative energy, which could affect the earth


EARTHQUAKE Bigger earthquakes expected

Science

... is based on facts, using ALL facts, not selecting some, ... and then tries to make sense of it... but always having doubts, being skeptical!

Who has the scientific authority for tsunami warning?

In Thailand the

National Disaster Warning Center (NDWC)

- has the scientific and legal authority
- established in 2005
- today under the ICT Ministry
- working 24/7/365
- responsible for (tsunami) early warning
- getting necessary data from other agencies (e.g. Seismological Bureau of the Thai Meteorological Department)
- making sense of all the data available and then if necessary issue tsunami warning, watch, or information

Scientific authority from credibility?



20 July 2011

Smith Dharmasaroja, head of the National Disaster Warning Center, predicts that in 2100, Bangkok will have become a new "Atlantis." This meteorologist's analysis, as pessimistic as it may sound, is considered credible. In the 1990s he correctly forecast the devastating December 2004 tsunami.

.... the 2004 tsunami forecasted?

17 July 1998 Papua New Guinea Tsunami

Mw 7.0 earthquake caused a large undersea landslide, Landslide triggered a tsunami that hit the coast, More than 2200 people at one beach were killed.

- Bangkok Post, 15 August 1998
 Tsunami fear unfounded, say officials
- The Nation, 18 August 1998
 Phuket tourism sector decries tsunami warning
 Smith (Dharmmasaroj) has reaffirmed his belief of the likelihood
 of a tsunami and personally informed Prime Minister Chuan
 Leekpai of the danger last Saturday.

This is an <u>earthquake/tsunami hazard analysis!</u>

— It is NOT a prediction or forecast!

Science as a fundament of our society

with "more" science with more information

- = more understanding !?
- = more clearness !?
- = more unambiguousness!?

also -> more uncertainty

→ more open questions we cannot forecasts earthquakes when is the next tsunami?

→ → looking for credible sources (faces) in the jungle of information

Our brain – a belief engine

Constant flow of information into the brain

– how to sort all this and give it a meaning?

Brain tries to find a meaning = forming a belief

Trying to fit information to the belief to support it

It "likes" the belief - makes it more solid

- looks more for supporting evidence
- looks less for other explanations

"belief-dependent realism" (Shermer 2011) what we believe determines our reality

but

facts (reality) + having doubts determine our believe = Science



Superstition haunts forest 25/07/2011

.. three army helicopters crashing in just eight days...

"The guardian spirits here are very fierce," said one resident.

Kaeng Krachan National Park head Chaiwat Limlikhit-aksorn said he felt bad vibes were emanating from the forest

Natural resources permanent secretary Chote Trachoo attended a rite yesterday to present food offerings near Kaeng Krachan reservoir to ward off bad omens.

.. a forest ranger, said he did not believe in supernatural forces.

He knows the reality – this determines his believe = Science
